



# **Become a GARC Research Fellow**

<u>Apply now</u> to be part of the 2023-2024 cohort of Global Action Research Collaborative (GARC) fellows! The application deadline has been extended to October 14, 2022. Participation in GARC is open to all girls' school educators, including those from non-member schools.

GARC is the <u>world's first action research program</u> that engages girls' school educators from around the world in disciplined, sustained action research. Designed as an entry-level introduction to action research, GARC is an 18-month program that includes comprehensive training so that it is accessible to all girls' school educators.



In addition to online training, fellows will attend in-person workshops at the ICGS Conference in June 2023 before engaging in their research. Fellows will then share findings from their resulting research with attendees at the ICGS Conference in June 2024.

Samar S. Ali is a Research Professor of Political Science and Law at Vanderbilt University, the founding President and CEO of Millions of Conversations, and co-chair of the Vanderbilt Project on Unity & American Democracy. Her work focuses on negotiating positive compromise through utilizing conflict-resolution best practices among people, communities and nations experiencing polarization. Ali holds over 15 years of experience in international relations and legal practice. As a conflict resolution practitioner and mediator, she is

a recipient of the White House Fellows IMPACT Award and Vanderbilt University's Young Alumni Professional Achievement Award.

**Dani Shapiro** is a best-selling novelist and memoirist and host of the podcast Family Secrets (now in its sixth season). Her work has been featured in The New York Times, The New Yorker, Vogue, and Time. She has taught at Columbia and New York University and is the co-founder of the Sirenland Writers Conference. She lives in Litchfield County, Connecticut.

Margaret Riley King is a partner and literary agent in WME's global book division. # **ICGS Grants: Two Fantastic Opportunities to Benefit Students**

Every year, the Coalition offers upper division students at member schools the opportunity to attend (virtually or in person) the **Student Leadership** Conference (SLC), sponsored by the Alliance of Girls' Schools Australasia. The SLC is an extraordinary opportunity to learn, interact, and grow in awareness of both self and others, and as both a leader and a team player. The conference provides unparalleled opportunities for girls to explore leadership styles and strategies, reflect on their own leadership aspirations, and build meaningful lifelong connections with other young leaders. Two grants will be awarded for the upcoming SLC, which will take place January 16-18, 2023.
