OAK Returns from The Hill



OAK's Executive Director, Brooke Gentile, traveled to Washington D.C. earlier this month urging Congress to take up climate action in the next Farm Bill and proclaiming that organic practices are a win for Kentucky farmers. Brooke serves on the Organic Farmers Association (OFA) Governing Council. Together with the OFA Policy Council and farmers from across the country, a group of over 25 people met with members of Congress and USDA staff through 50 meetings in 2 days. The group seized opportunities to share stories from farmers that illustrated why organic priorities need to be present in the Farm Bill. In Washington D.C. these farmers and food systems changemakers joined others for the Farmers for Climate: Rally for Resilience organized by the National Sustainable Agriculture Coalition (NSAC), Heal Food Alliance and many other organizations and advocates. Farm Bill 2023

The federal Farm Bill is reauthorized by Congress roughly once every five years. The current Farm Bill expires in September 2023. This means that we have a twice-in-a-decade opportunity to advocate for a new Farm Bill that invests in environmental conservation, advances food justice, and confronts climate change. This legislation has an enormous impact on farmers' livelihoods and how the U.S. food system operates. The Farm Bill influences who farms and where, what production methods farmers use, and how profitable farm businesses are across farming and food systems. The Farm Bill also influences who can access nutrition assistance, the safety of our air and water, and the stability of rural jobs and economies.

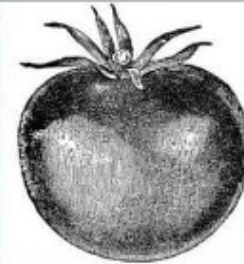

Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)

Applications are due March 31, 2023

USDA Announces March 31, 2023, Application Cutoff for Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) ***Including Dedicated Funding for Organic Producers***

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Kentucky has announced a funding opportunity for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP). Kentucky NRCS has just over \$6.5 million to obligate to new CSP contracts, including a minimum of \$200,000 specifically for organic producers.

The deadline for Kentucky CSP applications to be considered for funding during this federal fiscal year is March 31, 2023. Through CSP, conventional and organic agricultural producers and forest landowners earn payments for expanding conservation activities while maintaining agricultural production on their land. Conservation activities include practices such as cover crops, pest management, and pollinator habitat. CSP also encourages adoption of new technologies and management techniques.

While applications are accepted throughout the year, interested producers must submit applications to their local NRCS office by the deadline to ensure their applications are considered for 2023 funding.

"The Conservation Stewardship Program is a great tool for organic producers to improve conservation efforts on their operation," said Casey Schrader, Acting NRCS Kentucky State Conservationist. "Many of the offered conservation activities help to address organic producer concerns such as improving soil health and attracting pollinators to improve crop production."

NRCS Equity in Conservation Outreach Cooperative Agreements

Applications are due April 27, 2023

The primary goal of this outreach opportunity is for the National Resource Conservation Service (NRCS), in collaboration with partners, to expand conservation assistance to historically underserved producers and underserved communities and to provide opportunities for students to pursue careers in agriculture, natural resources, and related sciences.

Projects should support outreach activities that encourage diverse and inclusive participation in NRCS programs and introduce conservation planning and climate smart practices to protect farmland ecosystems, watersheds, and wildlife habitat in geographical areas of underserved communities ranging from rural agriculture to urban and small acreage producers.

Eligible applicants may propose projects that engage historically underserved producers and underserved communities equitably and offer access to opportunities through outreach activities that:

- Promote NRCS programs through education about, or demonstration of, conservation practices;
- Develop community conservation partnerships that encourage historically underserved producers to plan and protect farmland ecosystems, watersheds, and wildlife habitat in geographical areas of underserved communities;
- Inform small scale or urban agriculture producers about participation in conservation programs;
- Support education on, planning for, and adoption of conservation practices that are climate smart.

USDA Nationwide Survey for Prospective Farmers, Ranchers and Forest Managers

Take this [very important survey](#) by **March 31, 2023**! This voluntary, anonymous survey will take about 10 minutes to complete and asks about your general views and interactions with U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) agencies delivered by farm programs: Farm Service Agency (FSA), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and Risk Management Agency (RMA). All farmers, ranchers and forest managers are encouraged to take the survey. Existing customers and prospective customers both provide unique perspectives they'd like to hear. They'd especially like to hear from a new audience this year of prospective customers, those who don't know about USDA farm programs or have yet to work with them, and those who were unable to participate in the past.

USDA Announces Sign-up for Cost-Share Assistance for On-Farm Grain Storage in Areas with Limited Commercial Capacity Due to Severe Storms

Last week USDA announced that Kentucky producers in counties affected by the December 2021 tornadoes, among other states affected by eligible disaster events, can apply for cost-share assistance through the Emergency Grain Storage Facility Assistance Program (EGSFP). An initial allocation of \$20 million in cost-share assistance is available to agricultural producers in affected counties impacted by the damage to or destruction of large commercial grain elevators

as a result of natural disasters from Dec. 1, 2021, to Aug. 1, 2022. The application period opens later this month and closes **Dec. 29, 2023**.

USDA also has an existing [Farm Storage Facility Loan Program](#) that can immediately provide low-interest financing for eligible producers who may not be eligible for EGSFP but are in need of on-farm storage capacity.

"Since 2012, the National Cover Crop Survey has been extremely valuable in helping guide research priorities, direct communications and education efforts, provide data to researchers, and illustrate the effects of policy on cover crop use and adoption," says Dr. Rob Myers, regional director of extension programs for North Central SARE and director of the University of Missouri Center for Regenerative Agriculture. "Data from previous surveys have been used in scientific papers, business planning, extension efforts, media coverage of cover crops, and even included in testimony to Congress."

It's tax season! Let farmers.gov help.

Filing taxes can be challenging, especially if you are new to USDA programs or running a farm business, or if you are trying to forecast your farm's tax bill.
